Care Culture Transformation approach

- User involvement is one strategy for transformation of the care culture
- Combine models
- -Management Models for transformation of culture
- -Models of technological innovation



Mixed method 'toolbox' approach:

- Normative, descriptive, prescriptive models
- Ethnographic Field studies Quantitative validation studies
- Participant observation observing participation
- Small n studies large scale studies living labs
- Community as well as individual based methods
- Various groups: Elderly, Familiy, experts, social science, etc
