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The daily life of informal carers



- Routine Work
 - Activities of a normal day usually pre-defined
 - PADL, IADL, and activities in the social area
- Heteronomy Routine work Lack of time Daily life of informal carers

- Heteronomy
 - Due to care receiver (e.g., needs urgent help)
 - Due to external service proider (e.g., does not arrive on time)
- Lack of time
 - Leads to social exclusion
 - Cannot meet friends or do something they like to do



Understanding the Users' Context: Sample



10 informal carers

- 9 female, 1 male
- 5 caring for spouses, 3 caring for parents, 2 caring for children
- 2 are not living in the same household
- 55 to 80 years old; average was 64 years
- 2 still working








Understanding the Users' Context: Process






The case of Mrs Pünktlich



- Mrs. Pünktlich
 - 79 years old
 - Retired
 - Suffering from rheumatism
 - Interested in reading and gymnastics




- Married
- 2 sons and 1 grandchild
- Meet with friends rarely and most of the time in her home
- Care situation
 - Cares for her 84-years-old husband who is paralysed after an accident
 - For more than 6 years





The case of Mrs Pünktlich: Typical day





Informal carers need connection to ...



... professionals

- Need to plan the whole day around their arrivals and adapt if necessary
 - Information in advance about who is coming for help and when
 - Information asap about any delay
- Carer is not living in the same household
 - Possibility to meet external help personally
 - If not possible: technology support for exchange





Informal carers need connection to...



... care receiver

- Technology to support the mobility and enhance safety feeling of carer, e.g.
 - Surveillance mechanisms for Mrs Pünktlich to check over her husband when she is at the doctor, the supermarket etc. while her husband is sleeping in the midmorning
 - Mobile phone with alarm function to notify her in case of emergency
- Technology to support to keep track of the care receiver, if s/he is still mobile and can go outside...
 - Whereabouts of care receiver
 - Device providing GPS coordinates of care receiver
 - Device allowing to set off alarms in case of emergency



Informal carers need connection to...



... family and friends

- Family
 - For sharing the care work
 - Necessary to prevent social exclusion
- Friends
 - Maybe help with the care work
 - Important for social life
 - Stay in contact with video communication





Informal carers need connection to...



... other informal carers

- If family and friends are not available...
 - Find and talk to others in similar situations
 - Also anonymously if wanted
- Joint activities: Lunch4four
 - Two couples having lunch in different places
 - Connected with video communication





Conclusion



- Different types of connections are needed, but informal carers do not want/need to be available all time!
 - Priority is care and care receiver.
- Need for ambient solutions
 - E.g., Cube signalising who is currently available for a chat
- Need for wearable devices
 - E.g., smart watch informing what is going on with the care receiver
 - E.g., colour-changing scarf that signals an emergency with the care receiver
- Need for context and location based technologies
 - Device should offer limited functionality when not at home

















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
