How it AAL began?

- European funding program since 2008
 - 7 calls focusing on different issues
 - 154 transnational innovation projects with more than 1.000 partners funded
- National funding programmes
 - e.g. benefit in Austria since 2008
- AAL forum since 2009
- but some countries (e.g. Germany, Sweden) already resigned participation








AAL (test) regions / initiatives you may know or not!

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- Austrian funding program
 - 1 region (ModulAAR) finished last year
 - 3 regions (West-AAL, ZentrAAL, RegionAAL) on their ways in different project stages
 - 2 further regions to be started after this year's call
- European Innovation Partnership on Active and Healthy Ageing
 - 74 reference sites
 - Styria joined this year
- Styrian energy provider started a smart home project with AAL technologies

But somehow AAL has yet not reached every day's life. Why?

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- Top-down approaches do not seem to work convincingly fast enough in the health / care arena.
 - Can (economically driven) bottom-up approaches be the way to go and how can they be stimulated?
 - Can local stakeholders be achieved which “guarantee” sustainable enlargement after a project’s end?
- Young people have many strategies to cope with new technologies and their failures or shortcomings.
 - But what about older adults, do they accept the technologies?
 - Is the assisting technology really helpful for them or maybe even becoming an additional burden in their life and why?
- What would be a sufficient size for test / pilot regions? (e.g. Austria increased from 50 test households to 100)
 - Does this enlargement create benefits for the regions / evidence or is it more becoming a hard hurdle?
 - What can be learnt from the test regions?





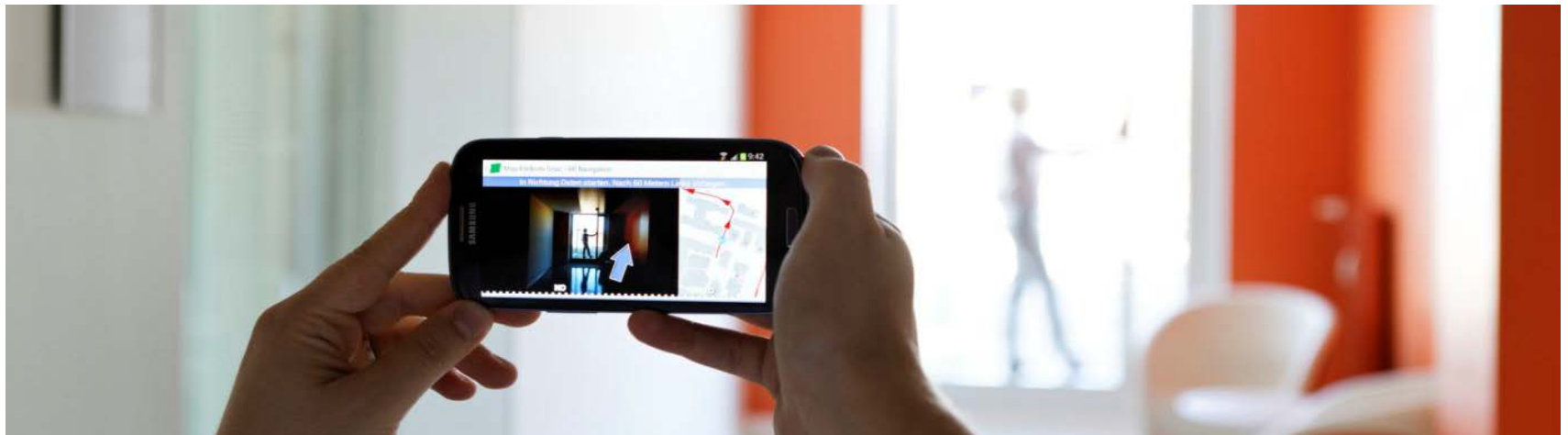
